Virtual Short Course on Public Health Planning for Hearing Impairment

The World Health Organization estimates that there are 430 million people in the world with moderate or higher levels of hearing loss. 80% of these people are estimated to live in low and middle income countries. WHO also states that the numbers with moderate or higher hearing loss in children and adults over 65 is greatest in the South East Asia, and Westen Pacific regions. The aim of this course is to enable participants to understand the magnitude and causes of hearing impairment and the challenges of providing hearing health in developing countries. The course will familiarize participants with public health approaches to ear and hearing care and show how to develop programmes for prevention and management.

Teaching: The course will be taught by experts who come from or who have lived and worked in developing countries. Teaching method of this course involves:

Accreditation & Methods of Assessment: There is no formal assessment but at the conclusion of the course, a certificate of attendance will be provided.

The World Health Organization estimates that there are about 430 million people in the world with with moderate or higher levels of hearing loss. 80% of these people live in the low and middle income countries.

- The major preventable causes of hearing impairment in low and middle income countries are middle ear infections, excessive noise, inappropriate use of certain drugs, problems during child birth and vaccine-preventable infections.
- At least half of all hearing impairment is preventable.
- Detecting and responding to hearing impairment in babies and young children is vital for the development of speech and language.
- Properly fitted hearing aids can improve communication in at least 90% of people with hearing impairment
- In developing countries, fewer than 1 in 40 people who needed a hearing aid have one.

Aim of this course is to enable participants to understand the magnitude and causes of hearing impairment and the challenges of providing hearing health in developing countries. The course will familiarize participants with public health approaches to ear and hearing health and show how to develop programmes for prevention and management at the local, district and national level.

This 10-day virtual course is particularly suitable if you:

- Are an Oto-laryngologist, Audiologist, or allied health professional, especially in the communication sciences, health planner or NGO worker
- Have an interest in the developing world.
- Are interested in starting, continuing or resuming a career in ear and hearing health in the developing world.
- Have an interest in the planning principles involved in establishing public health programmes for ear and hearing in the developing world.
- Are interested in working together with health workers from developing countries.

The course is especially relevant now since the World Health assembly ratified the WHO resolution on Prevention of Deafness and hearing Loss in May 2017. Almost all of the essential principles and tasks recommended by the Resolution are covered in this course. The Resolution can be downloaded from
